

**INTEGRATED GENERAL EDUCATION PROGRAM** The IGEP represents a portion of the **122 minimum credits required to earn a B.A. degree.** Please note that of those, a minimum of 45 credits (total from major and IGEP) must be upper division (300 and 400 level courses). IGEP requires a minimum of 12 credits (9 in the IGEP Minor + 3 Capstone) to be upper division.

**LASALLIAN HONORS** Students in the Lasallian Honors Program fulfill their IGEP requirements through a modified First Year Experience and a Lasallian Honors sequence for their minor and Capstone. They also must take a science with a lab component if their major does not already require it. A listing of Lasallian Honors courses is provided below.

**FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE** Students may complete these courses anytime during the first three semesters, but the freshman year is suggested.

- Courses include FYE101 First-Year Experience Anchor Course (4 cr.), E130 First-Year Writing (4 cr.), QR101 Quantitative Reasoning (3 cr.), TH111 Theological Thinking (3 cr.)

**IGEP MINOR** This is satisfied by completing ALL of the credit requirements for the Disciplinary Areas, with at least 18 cr. completed in one of the IGEP Minors listed below.

- Each minor offers courses from the following disciplines: Theology (3 cr.), Philosophy (3 cr.), History (3 cr.), Literature (3 cr.), Mathematics, Computer Science, and Natural Sciences (6 to 8 cr. with 1 course must include a lab component), Social Science (3 cr.), and Arts and Communication (3 cr.). 9 of the 18 credits completed within an IGEP Minor need to be upper division (300 and 400 level courses).

**ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS** include any Disciplinary requirements not taken in the IGEP Minor, 2 Wellness (Physical Education/Lifestyle) courses (0 cr.), CE101 Cultural Engagement Requirements (2 qualifying experiences, may also carry credit for another requirement), COM210 IGEP Public Speaking or COM class yet to be determined (3 cr.), 2 writing-rich courses in the major, and CAP499 IGEP Capstone (3 cr.).
